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Art Basel Miami is Back!

On the 4^{th} December, the 13^{th} edition of Art Basel Miami Beach opens.

The sunny landmark of the art calendar will again host a perfect mix of art, design, culture and parties, with over 260 galleries and nearly 80'000 visitors.

This year, the fair takes a more serious turn, with a strengthened focus on artists, curators, collectors rather than art, celebrities, and lavish nights. The Conversations programme will see a string of important artist's talks, with speakers such as Marina Abramovich, Lynda Benglis, Ryan Gander, Joseph Kosuth, Ryan McNamara, Pedro Reyes, Julian Schnabel, Shen Wei and Martha Wilson. An interesting debate will also take place on Dec.5th, discussing "the potential of digital platforms" both as creation and commerce tool.

As far as art goes, highlights of the fair will include, works by some of the speakers, as well as works by Barbara Kruger, Bill Viola, Frank Stella, Andy Warhol and cohorts. There will be art in public spaces, nearby hotels, clubs, galleries and boutiques all over the city.

From the big contemporary classics to street art, Miami is putting on its best show until December 7th.

Paris Photo 2014: Sharp Focus

The 18th edition of Paris Photo at the Grand Palais welcomed close to 60,000 visitors over five days last month as first-time exhibitors from Australia, Brazil, India and Taiwan joined forces with established European and US galleries to present a vibrant program enjoyed by high-profile collectors, major institutions and celebrities alike.


In total 169 exhibitors showcased the talents of 1231 photographers, from the legendary (Arbus, Klein, Stieglitz) to the cutting edge of contemporary (Christopher Williams at David Zwirner; Paul Graham at Pace MacGill; Timm Rautert at Parotta).

Highlights included Nicholas Nixon's complete series of The Brown Sisters at Fraenkel Gallery, an ongoing project that has seen the photographer capture his wife and her three sisters in arresting and intimate group portraits over the past 40 years, and the Robert Mapplethorpe solo show at Thaddaeus Ropac guest-curated by French actress Isabelle Huppert.

Audrey Tautou, Natalie Portman and husband Benjamin Millepied, Christian Lacroix and Jane Birkin were spotted alongside supercollectors such as François Pinault, Maja Hoffmann, Celso Gonzalez-Falla and Sondra Gilman. Major museum presences in the form of Tate, MOMA, J. Paul Getty Museum and LACMA ensured plenty of acquisitions, while signings by Bettina Rheims, Thomas Ruff, Richard Prince and Martin Parr kept photo-book fans happy.

Sales highlights included Diane Arbus' Exasperated Boy With Toy Hand Grenade at Howard Greenberg for a figure close to \$US500,000 and Stromae Forever by Pierre et Gilles at Galerie Daniel Templon for €EU120,000.

Rounding out the fair were: an exhibition of recent acquisitions by MOMA New York; Giorgio Armani's fifth edition of his ongoing Acqua series; and a curated selection of photographs from the JP Morgan Chase Art Collection. TM



Garry Winogrand: Auteur of the Street

A visual feast awaits Paris-bound connoisseurs of photography - the first Garry Winogrand retrospective in 25 years is currently at the Jeu de Paume, following successful showings at the Met Museum in New York, the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. and MOMA in San Francisco.

Born in 1928 and raised in the Bronx, Winogrand was briefly included in Edward Steichen's seminal *The Family of Man* exhibition at MOMA in New York in 1955. But it wasn't until the early 1960s that he began to make a name for himself as a distinctive chronicler of America's changing social landscape alongside contemporaries such as Joel Meyerowitz, Tod Papageorge and Lee Friedlander.

Winogrand was an auteur of street photography and some of his most memorable images were taken on the sidewalks and in the parks of Manhattan. But he also travelled to Chicago, Washington, Miami and farther afield to Texas and Southern California in his quest to "see what something looks like as a photograph".

Launching himself into the startling, sometimes jarring, theatre of the public space, testing again and again the propensity of his eye (and his will) to compose pictures from the rough materials he jostled up against, Winogrand formulated a dynamic visual language that spoke of disjunction and irony, restlessness and rancour - and, very occasionally, a fleeting sense of grace. Most of all, he revelled in a pleasure in looking.

But his extraordinary work ethic, manifested in a hyper-prolific output

and a certain inflexibility regarding technique and subject matter, inflicted its own injuries on the artist. Upon his death from cancer in 1984, it emerged that he had effectively ceased to sort or otherwise edit his raw material. The flâneur had, it seems, finally lost focus.

Winogrand left behind an enormous trove of images - around a quarter of a million - that he had not even sighted, a third of which were yet to be developed. This exhaustive and finely curated exhibition includes many of these never-before-seen photographs as selected by curators Leo Rubinfien, Erin O'Toole (San Francisco MOMA) and Sarah Greenough (National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C.).

Be Inspired: Art Auction Finds the Feel-Good **Factor**

A perfect storm of glamour, goodwill and great art converged on London's Saatchi Gallery last month to raise much needed funds for children with life-limiting illnesses and their families. Donated works by Tracey Emin RA, Marc Quinn, Andy Warhol, Xavier Mascaró and plenty more went under the hammer at BE INSPIRED on Wednesday, 1 October, with proceeds benefiting the Prince's Foundation for Children and the Arts to the tune of £225,000.

Keeping the royal connection front of mind was star guest Cressida Bonas, whose presence had London's social pages speculating as to whether the fledgling actress might have rekindled her relationship with Prince Harry. Also lending support was celebrity sculptor Frances Segelman, who has made high-profile busts of HM The Queen and HRH The Duke of Edinburgh - she donated a gravity-defying nude bronze to the event.

The evening's highest bid, at £18,000, was for Xavier Mascaró's iron and ceramic sculpture Small Guardian. It seemed appropriate given the Spanish artist's debut solo UK show was running concurrently at the Saatchi Gallery, and that a phalanx of Small Sculpture's quietly monumental 'big brothers' had been installed on the forecourt outside.

Following the live auction courtesy of Paddle8, a standing supper, musical entertainment and a smartly curated online auction kept 450 of London's contemporary art lovers schmoozing until well past their bedtimes, and on a school night, too.

But it was all for the children, and in this regard the Prince's Foundation is nothing short of inspirational - a current focus is the Start Hospices program, which facilitates time-out for children and their families in the form of visits to art galleries, museums and theatres.
